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Kentucky JCI Senate Saves the Day!

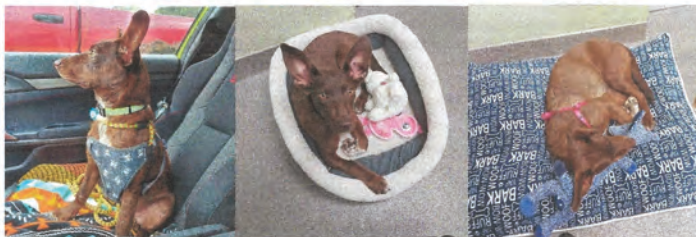

Pet License Tags

All dogs and cats residing in Nelson County are required to be licensed annually. The cost is \$5.00 for each spayed or neutered pet. Intact pets are \$20.00 each. There are multi-pet discounts and lifetime licenses if your pet has a microchip. The purpose is twofold: to provide an ID tag so that a pet's owner can be quickly identified and located, and to generate revenue to benefit the animal control and shelter program. State law does require that dogs, cats, and ferrets be vaccinated for rabies, and that dogs wear a rabies tag. You may print out and mail an application with the appropriate fee, or you may apply in person at the Nelson County Animal Shelter, between 10-4 Monday – Friday, and 10-2 on Saturday, 2391 New Haven Rd, Bardstown KY 40004 (502-349-2082). You can download the application from our website www.ncanimalservices.org.

Annual Licenses must be renewed every year by December 31.
Fill out a form for each pet. Make as many copies as needed.
Lost pets wearing a current county tag get home quickly.

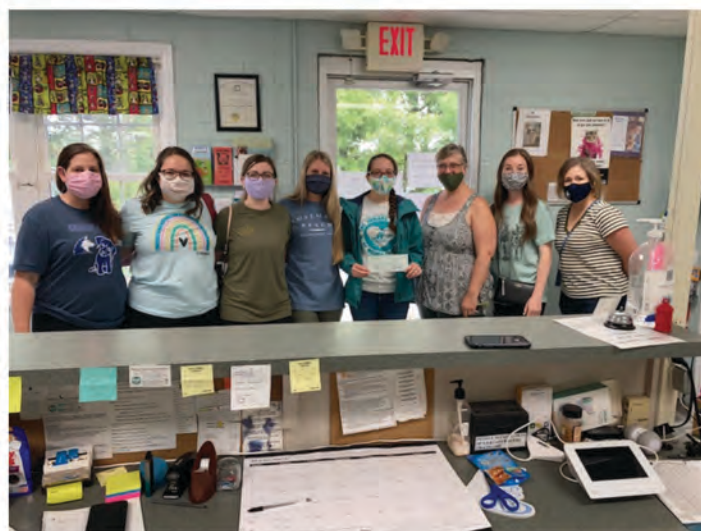


Sam Taylor Recovering from Accident

Kathleen spent a twenty-three-year career as a teacher for Special Needs children, owned two businesses as a successful entrepreneur, followed by a fifteen-year career as a Southwest flight attendant. As a Gold Star Widow, she volunteers as a Military Spouse Advocate.

This began my realization and journey that I (we) could do more to help abandoned animals suffer less."

Since then, she has bought a house for Mama cat in Maywood and added to her family with a tuxedo cat abandoned on the golf course. At times she is hostess to additional abandoned cats that she fosters in between their finding forever homes.

Kathleen sees Bardstown as an amazing place on the world's map. "Everywhere I have traveled I run into people that say, "I know Bardstown. The Bourbon Capital of the world!"

She added, "Possibly we can add to our local fame with an eye to growing the future welfare of our domestic animals with a Rescue Sanctuary in our future. If any town can do this it's Bardstown! A town that echoes in eternity."

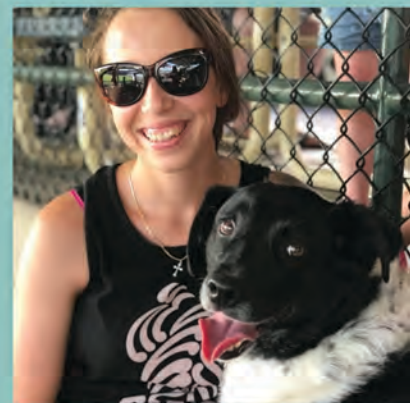
Lydia Graves
